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CENTRAL AMERICA UPDATE

- SUBJECT: (S) Nicaragua goes to World Court
- ISSUE: (C) The impact of Nicaraguan action of charging the US with intervention in internal affairs and armed action (mining ports).
- BACKGROUND: (S) On 9 April Nicaragua filed an application with the International Court of Justice to institute proceedings against the United States. Charges are: "The United States of America is using military force against Nicaragua and intervening in Nicaragua's internal affairs in violation of Nicaragua's sovereignty, territorial integrity and political independence and of the most fundamental and universally-accepted principles of international law". Further charges are also made of violations of the UN Charter, OAS Charter and the Convention on Rights and Duties of States. The US has notified the World Court that we will not accept their jurisdiction in Central America for two years in order to give the Contadora process a chance.

OTHER FACTORS: (S)

- Approximately 8 ships of foreign registry have hit and received minor damage from mines placed in the port area of Corinto. Some of the national registries involved are the USSR, Panama, and Great Britain. CIA 3.3(b)(1)(6)
- Great Britain has made an informal protest to the US. OSD 3.3(b)(1)(6)



- The mining of the Corinto port has been successful in causing a significant adverse economic impact on both imports and exports. The oil refinery is being forced to shut down for approximately 2 months for lack of crude; cotton and coffee are reported to be piling up on piers awaiting shipment.

--There is, however, more of a downside to the mining. [Redacted]

DISCUSSION: (S)

- This is the latest of several "diplomatic" initiatives by Nicaragua to focus world opinion as well as US domestic opinion on alleged US action while diverting attention from and attempting to lessen by comparison Nicaraguan and Cuban support for guerrillas in El Salvador.

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
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- This could be a campaign to block any US reaction to introducing MIG aircraft into Nicaragua. Work continues on their new and improved airfields which could become operational in the near future and be capable of supporting high performance aircraft.
- Nicaragua could be planning to significantly step up support for El Salvador guerrillas and/or introduction of guerrilla activity in Honduras this fall.

POSITION: That no major policy changes be made at this time. DoD should continue with the Granadero I exercise, and continue to push for passage of the \$62 million El Salvador support package and \$21 million for anti-Sandinista support.

- We need to develop an effective political strategy to cope with the Nicaraguan election (scheduled Sunday in November before our election-Tuesday). Our approach has to make clear to the outside world the real election conditions in Nicaragua.

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CENTRAL AMERICA UPDATE (Cont'd)

SUBJECT: (U) Aid to El Salvador

ISSUE: [REDACTED] Supplies for the conduct of military operations in El Salvador remain dangerously low. We no longer have any obligational authority remaining in the \$44.5M in FY84 CRA. DSAA estimates that if we do not have appropriation by 13 Apr 84, we must seek other authority to fund critical supply/training lines.

BACKGROUND: (U) The FY84 supplemental request for \$178.8M remains before Congress and we do not expect funding before July. A compromise on our emergency request for \$92.75M of these supplemental funds has been voted in the Senate and approved at \$61.75M. It ^{may} will now go to a House/Senate Conference Committee.

DISCUSSION: [REDACTED]

- We are rapidly approaching a point where we must provide additional funding for the ESAF or they will begin to run out of critical supplies (ammunition, bombs, rockets, etc.)
- The training of additional battalions will suffer as there will be no funding to prepare trainers for replacement and for pre-deployment functions.
- An additional and sorely needed rotary wing aviation training course will not be undertaken after the current group of 20 pilots graduates.
- These and other critical lines within our projected security assistance supplemental need to be funded by 13 April 1984.
- Although the Senate members of the House/Senate conference have been named, the House has not taken any action to move the legislation or appoint conference committee members.
- Secretary Shultz has called on the House leadership to request expedited action on the emergency supplemental.
- There is increasing reluctance amongst House leadership (Speaker O'Neill, Cong. Whitten) to go to conference citing too many unresolved issues. Congressman Jim Wright is expected to raise this issue again with the House leadership on 10 April; however, Congressional liaison is not optimistic that he will persuade Speaker O'Neill.

POSITION: [REDACTED] We should continue to push for House and Senate action but it must come by Friday, 13 April. If authorization of funding supplemental funding is not available by this date, we must seriously consider authorization under section 21(d) AECA.

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
