We present our greeting and according to the Committee minutes of the Archeological site protection, which approved by the Ambassador Bremer and the Minister of Culture, as they considered the protection of archeological sites is the most significant task of our Board since the governorate sites were exposing to various hazards. In the mentioned meeting it has been decided that the ministry of culture through our Board will support the new guards financially, that is by financing their salaries and their other current expenses from ministry of finance.

It has been decided to add (578) guards, who been previously appointed by the provisional coalition forces or by the local provisional coalitional Authority, to be added to the present guards who are presently working for the Board, and to be 1850 in number.

The mentioned committee declared that the required financial needs for the salary payment will be for the amount (1,910,568,000) one milliard, nine hundred, ten million, and five hundred sixty eight thousand ID annually, according to the below mentioned sheduale.



The following information and requests need to be transmitted to the local SBAH (State Board of Antiquities and Heritage) Inspectors in order to be implemented, with the help of CPA staff in the Governorates, before next Monday, November 24.

As the Inspectors have already been told by the SBAH Director General of Excavations, it is their responsibility to select, among their own Guards, between two and four candidates to be sent to Baghdad for training. The ideal candidate should:

be between 18 and 50 years old; have a Secondary School Diploma; be able to read and write in Arabic.

The commendation by the Inspector on their previous service could be considered equivalent to the above mentioned requirements.

The names of the candidates should reach me or the Director General of Excavation by November 24.

The candidates should come to Baghdad, for an Introductory Selection, November 26 or 27. The venue is the **Iraqi Police Academy**, next to the Sport Stadium.

All candidates will follow a three days class (Nov. 29 and 30, Dec. 1st).

On Dec. 2nd, the 25 selected candidates will be admitted to a 19 days TRAIN – THE-TRAINERS Course, ending December 20.

The course will be overseen by ASP (b)(6)


At the end of the course they will be qualified as FPS Trainers and will be able to confer, after proper training, FPS status to the guards currently on the payrolls of the SBAH.

Dear Ambassador Osio,

Having recently completed a review of my region's financial situation, I have concluded that I have sufficient funds on hand to fund another \$500,000 in support for implementation of the archeological security measures we discussed several weeks ago. Hence, we will allocate \$1 million to this purpose instead of \$500,000.

We will begin with three provinces: Babel, al-Qadisiyya, and al-Wasit. Thereafter, we will implement the program in al-Anbar, Najaf, and Karbala'.

I have placed Lt. Col. (b)(3): 10 USC §130b my police and security specialist, in charge of overseeing these expenditures, in keeping with the plan you were kind enough to give me. I will ask him to keep you apprised of our progress.

World Monuments Fund & Getty Conservation Institute Proposal to NEH

An Integrated System for Cultural Heritage Inventory and Assessment in Iraq

Statement of Significance

War, looting and future development projects have already and will in the future impact very negatively the integrity and significance of cultural resources in Iraq, especially archaeological sites and historic urban centers.

The World Monuments Fund, in partnership with the Getty Conservation Institute and in coordination with UNESCO, proposes to develop a program with the State Board of Antiquities and Heritage for training staff in the methodology and techniques of site assessment and condition recording, and to develop technical tools for the recording and management of information related to the location, condition, and threat to the cultural resources of Iraq.

The training will be conducted mostly in Jordan, to minimize security concerns, and the development of the database tools will be in the USA, with the system deployed in Iraq during the second year of the 2-year project.

The system will take advantage of Geographic Information System (GIS) and Geographic Positioning System (GPS) technologies to locate and map site locations in order to provide the State Board of Antiquities and Heritage officials the appropriate monitoring and assessment tools to evaluate risk and minimize negative impact to cultural resources.

At the end of the project the system will be managed in Iraq by the State Board of Antiquities and Heritage, and it is expected to contain information on more than 10,000 archaeological sites, and a similar number of historic sites and monuments. This project is of high significance for the development of a heritage management philosophy in Iraq and for encouraging further protection of the cultural resources of the country.





Your Excellency:

Following upon your meeting with Gaetano Palumbo, Director of Archaeological Conservation of the World Monuments Fund in Paris on October 10, we would like to formally present our offer of assistance to the Ministry of Culture of Iraq. Upon your acceptance of the proposal, we will begin to prepare a workplan and mobilize the project in the weeks and months ahead.

As you know, the World Monuments Fund (WMF) and the Getty Conservation Institute (GCI) have established a collaboration to assist Iraq in the reconstruction of its cultural heritage conservation infrastructure. In the letter that Dr. Palumbo hand-delivered to you at the time of your meeting, he indicated four areas of involvement related to archaeological sites and monuments where we could contribute substantively.

We propose jointly to assist the Ministry of Culture and the State Board for Antiquities and Heritage in the areas of emergency conservation of monuments and sites, inventory and condition assessment to help establish mid- and long-term priorities, training in these areas. We are also ready to allocate resources for a project of inventory and assessment of the archaeological and historic sites of Iraq, to serve as a computerized tool for monitoring and managing the cultural heritage of the country.

In order to begin, however, we propose to establish communication and eventually meet with the professionals within the State Board of Antiquities who will help us to identify priorities and issues in the protection, conservation, and management of cultural heritage sites in Iraq. Therefore, if you agree, we would be grateful if you could assign a senior person from the Ministry of Culture and the State Board of Antiquities and Heritage to liaise and communicate with us.



Dear Professor Russell,

I owe your contact details to Bonnie Magness-Gardiner at the Department of State, Washington. I am writing to invite you to explore the possibility of establishing collaboration with the Malta Centre for Restoration, particularly in projects concerning cultural heritage in Iraq.

May I respectfully introduce the Malta Centre for Restoration (MCR), which is incorporated by law as Malta's national agency in the provision of conservation services in the cultural heritage sector. MCR was originally established as a partnership between the University of Malta (established 1592) and the Ministry responsible for Cultural Heritage in Malta. Today it has grown into a regional centre of excellence with over 120 staff members (including some 10 different nationalities on its full-time staff) working within well-equipped spacious premises from its Malta base at Bighi, Kalkara.

MCR is one of the larger conservation centres world-wide, with over 16,000 square metres of laboratory, teaching and administrative space on its Bighi campus, organised into seven main divisions. More details about MCR's Diagnostic Science Laboratories, Documentation Division and Conservation Intervention Division are available at www.mcr.edu.mt where more than 500 pages of information are posted about the Centre. MCR's operational model is that of a "teaching hospital" and one of its divisions is the Institute for Conservation and Restoration Studies (ICRS), which operates as a faculty of the University of Malta. Although created as recently as the late 'nineties, ICRS today offers undergraduate and post-graduate courses in various aspects of conservation as well as vocational training in the field. ICRS has now over 100 students in its vocational, B.Cons (Hons), M.Cons and PhD streams. (The B.Cons and M.Cons streams are university level 11-month-per-year courses which also permit students to spend up to 50% of their time in practicum within MCR's conservation laboratories as well as a strong element of fieldwork). In 2004, two further degree programs, the B.Doc (Hons) (ie documentation of Cultural Heritage) and the M.Sc Conservation Science, are also expected to be added to its course offerings to the international student community.

While MCR's teaching programs and conservation laboratories cater for a wide variety of artefacts (paintings, ceramics, metals, glass, stone, textiles, books, works of art on paper, wood, etc.), MCR's area of specialisation include architectural stone conservation and ICT applications in cultural heritage, especially in documentation and distance-learning. MCR has pioneered the use of SEWAN (Satellite-Enabled Wide Area Network) and SEVC (Satellite-Enabled Video Conferencing) in the cultural heritage sector and has attracted more than 3 million Euros of European Commission funding to its IKONOS program. As Contracting Authority to the European Commission, MCR has utilised the latest bandwidth-pooling technologies to successfully implement a fully-interactive network with SEWAN nodes in Algeria, Morocco, Jordan, Greece, Malta and the Netherlands to mention some of the operational nodes in the 12-institution, 8 country IKONOS consortium. More details about IKONOS are available at www.ikonosheritage.org and will help you understand how, for example, in 2003, 179 students from Jordan and around the Mediterranean benefited from MCR's distance learning programmes in conservation of cultural heritage.

Malta's unique heritage in the form of prehistoric temples (24 temple units across 14 sites are inscribed as UNESCO World Heritage sites) were the primary testing ground for *TheaLasermetry*, the hybrid methodology developed by MCR's Documentation Division for fusing digital photogrammetry, laser scanning and theodolite total station surveying systems into one of the fastest and most accurate 3D imaging systems for archaeological and architectural sites available in the cultural heritage sector. With 5 papers about related methodologies

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published internationally over the past 12 months alone, MCR's experience with *Thealasermetry* and other systems has made it a very active member within CIPA and the RecordIM initiatives.

The Iraq Heritage Project

We understand that, since September you are now fully immersed in the cultural heritage sector in Iraq. As early as April 2003, MCR presented its Iraq Heritage Project (I-Heritage) to the US authorities and has since continued to develop this project towards its aims of a US\$ 130 million 10-year programme. We are writing to ensure that I-Heritage achieves synergy with other projects within Iraq and that duplication of effort is avoided while collaboration is maximized.

I-Heritage constitutes 6 major sub-projects:

- i. The creation of an interim Iraq Centre for Conservation and Restoration (ICCR)
- ii. The establishment of a technological infrastructure extending at least 10 nodes of the IKONOS network within Iraq
- iii. Capacity-building of Iraqi conservation professionals through a variety of training programmes in conservation of sites and artefacts
- iv. The deployment of FETs (Field Expeditionary Teams) for 3D Imaging of as many as possible of Iraq's known 10,000 archaeological sites
- v. The establishment of a permanent ICCR facility
- vi. The co-ordination, national and international, required for the successful implementation of I-Heritage and other projects in the sector within Iraq

On the 24th October 2003, during the Madrid International Iraq Donors Conference, the Government of Malta announced that it would be making grant-in-aid available to Iraq and that this would be exclusively in the cultural heritage sector channeled through the Malta Centre for Restoration. MCR today administers a growing Iraq Heritage Fund which is dedicated exclusively to the implementation of the I-Heritage project. It is expected that MCR's first mission to Iraq will be taking place some time during December 2003/January 2004. We anticipate that meetings with yourself, Donny George and other persons currently active within the sector would be amongst the main objectives of our visit. Ms. Magness-Gardiner has kindly undertaken to send you a copy of our I-Heritage outline plan via (b)(3), 10 during his forthcoming trip to Iraq next week and I trust that, however much that may require amendment because of subsequent developments, it will provide a useful basis for discussion.

An Open Invitation

While we look forward to our meeting during our forthcoming trip to Iraq, may we take this opportunity to invite you to visit Malta for 2-3 days during your next trip to Europe, during which visit we would be delighted to have you go over our facilities and enter into detailed discussions about collaboration within I-Heritage and other projects. Dear Ambassador Bondioli-Osio:

Thank you again for supporting the project we would like to undertake with SBAH on the development of a computer-based inventory of immovable cultural heritage sites.

I am writing to discuss with you the possibility of organizing a meeting in Amman between representatives of SBAH, CPA, and WMF/GCI, sometimes during the week between December 15 and 22, in order to discuss the aim of this project, and outline a strategy for its implementation. The choice of Amman is not casual: until that time, in fact, Dr. Stephen Savage, the newly appointed coordinator of the Center for the Archaeology of the Middle Eastern Landscape will be training Jordanian Department of Antiquities employees in the use of a new version of the Jordan Antiquities Database and Information System (JADIS), which I helped to develop in the early 1990s.

While the original inventory of Jordanian sites was only based on textual databases, the new version developed by Dr. Savage is a full GIS, allowing the operators to see site location in its context (background information is provided by both scanned maps and satellite imagery donated by NASA). More than 10,000 sites are contained in the database.

By meeting in Amman, the officials from SBAH will be able to see the system on which we intend to base also the Iraqi inventory, talk to the Jordanian trainees, and see possible facilities in which some training can be conducted, including the computer and conservation laboratories of the American Center of Oriental Research, a possible partner in this project. As the project also involves training in the mapping and assessment of site conditions, one or more Jordanian sites could also be taken as field schools for the SBAH employees who will be assigned to the project. By taking advantage of both the geographical and cultural proximity of Jordan we hope to be able to offer an environment where training and field activities can be conducted even as the situation in Iraq remains unstable from a security point of view. Of course, as situation will improve, further training will be conducted in Iraq, including the deployment of the database in the facility most appropriate, but we believe that by anticipating the mobilization of training activities in a nearby country we will be able to gain precious time in the race to better protect the sites and monuments of Iraq.

If you think that a meeting at such short notice is feasible, I would like to ask you to convey this message to the Minister of Culture and his colleagues at SBAH, and verify whether they could be able to travel to Amman during the time indicated above. All their expenses would be covered by our organization.

I am available to further discuss with you this issue, and to follow your advice on whom should be invited to this first meeting, if it becomes a real possibility.

I would like to thank you in advance for your kind help in this matter.

I can assure you that Minister al-Jaza'iri needs all the help he can get and welcomes your generous offer wholeheartedly.

I would appreciate if you could give me more indications on the subjects you are working on.

For our part, I think it is useful to inform you about the three projects at the top of our priority list, as identified by the Minister in my daily meetings with him.

1. Archeological Sites Protection Project

The Project has been approved by the Minister and by CPA, and is already underway. If everything goes according to plan, by the end of 2003 all site guards will receive FPS (Facilities Protection Service) status, which gives them the right to detain looters for 12 hours, a uniform, additional weapons and forty 4wd vehicles. The essential part of the project is a communication system that will allow the guards to call Internal Security Forces to the site under threat. I have been assured that both Iraqi Police and Coalition Forces will be instructed to respond immediately when requested to intervene on sites. The funding (over \$1 Million) for this communication system and for vehicles is not yet guaranteed. In the second phase, in 2004, I plan to work into the Project the corresponding UNESCO project (\$ 192,100).

2. Iraq National Museum.

The leadership of the Museum is currently trying to put into effect the advice received from a State Department expert team, who visited Baghdad in late October. We are still waiting for the full report, but we (read John Russell) are already working preparing the tender documents on rehabilitation of the structure and the equipment (\$ 2 Million). The staff of the Museum needs training in conservation, in creating data banks of their inventories, and in almost everything else you can think of. The funding prospects for rehabilitation of facilities are good, but sponsors for training programs are still needed.

3. Iraq National Library

A Library of Congress delegation has just been in Baghdad to assess the needs for a new National Library, the old building having been burned and looted. They determined that the bulk of the collection (2 million items) has been saved through the dedication and sense of duty of the staff. They have recommended to the Minister three separate semi-autonomous entities: National Library, National Archives, and Manuscript Collection. None of the three has, at the moment, a roof over its head. The building chosen for the new National Library needs rehabilitation and the construction of a stacks annex, at a total cost of \$ 5 million. All the equipment, first for cleaning the books, for freeze-drying and cleaning the flooded

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archive materials, for the labs etc., etc., does not exist. The staff needs training in modern techniques in all the components of a 21st century library.

As you can see the problems are serious and urgent and can be solved only with the help and support of the international scholarly community and in particular with your own very precious help and support. In particular, I urge you to consider sponsoring the following high-priority projects, which should fall within the areas of specialty of the World Monuments Fund and the Getty Conservation Institute:

1. Assist the State Board of Antiquities and Heritage in acquiring for the Archeological Sites Protection Project an adequate communication system. Work with us to ensure that the nonrenewable resource of Iraq's archaeological sites is protected from looters. At present, the extent of the destruction is catastrophic, with entire ancient cities reduced to cratered moonscapes. The urgent priority is protection. If the sites are lost, there will be little to record in your proposed data base.
2. Establish objects and paper conservation training programs, both for Museums and Libraries staff, at the Beirut Museum (b)(6) and/or at the conservation lab at ACOR in Amman. Iraqi conservators need modern training, but have difficulty traveling far abroad for long periods of time. A training program nearby would provide easier access and a familiar language.
3. Fund extended visits by expert conservators to Baghdad. This would allow the conservation of difficult objects to commence, while at the same time exposing Iraqi conservators to modern methods. There is an urgent need for such expertise for water-damaged objects in the Iraq Museum and for waterlogged mold-damaged archives from the National Library.
4. Establish a Conservation Institute in Baghdad, staffed initially by visiting conservators. The purpose of this institute would be to serve as a resource for conservation projects nationwide, and to train the next generation of conservators, thereby establishing modern conservation in Iraq. You could work with UNESCO. They are seeking funds for a "Rehabilitation of Regional Centre for the Conservation of the Cultural Property in the Arab Countries" project.

As I can see from a today's Baghdad perspective, with my own limited understanding as a non archeologist, computerized GIS and GPS based data banks look more like a medium term prospect.

Tomorrow, Nov. 8, I will bring your letter and my answer to Minister Mufeed al-Jaza'iri. I will brief you, as soon as possible, on his reactions, keeping in mind the next Friday deadline. I look forward to discussing these ideas further with you.

We have the pleasure of informing you that the Getty Conservation Institute and the World Monuments Fund have established a collaboration to assist Iraq in the reconstruction of its cultural heritage conservation infrastructure. Through the assistance of Professor John Russell, we have been in touch with His Excellency the Minister of Culture, Mr. Mufeed al-Jazairi, to formally request approval for our collaborative enterprise to offer assistance to Iraq. We understand from Professor Russell that the initiative has been approved by the Minister, and we wish formally to advise you of our plans, which are presently still in the development stage.

Our Iraq initiative is under the supervision of Timothy P. Whalen, Director of the Getty Conservation Institute (GCI), and Bonnie Burnham, President of the World Monuments Fund (WMF); those with direct responsibility for implementation and management of the initiative are Neville Agnew, GCI, Los Angeles, and Gaetano Palumbo, WMF, Paris.

We propose jointly to assist the Ministry of Culture and the State Board of Antiquities and Heritage in the areas of emergency conservation of monuments and sites, inventory and condition assessment to help establish mid- and long-term priorities, and training in these areas. We are also ready to allocate resources for a project of inventory assessment of the archaeological and historic sites of Iraq to serve as a computerized tool for monitoring and managing the cultural heritage of the country.

We hope that this initiative meets with your approval and support, and we would value your suggestions in the ways in which we could be most effective in the difficult challenges of the present situation in the country.

Dear Mario (I hope you do not mind the familiarity of the address),

I have heard from numerous sources that you will be taking up the position of Senior Advisor to the Iraq Ministry of Culture soon. I am extremely pleased that you will be undertaking this very important role and believe that your presence will present many opportunities for improvement of the situation.

You may also know that a friend of mine, John Russell, will be arriving in Baghdad in a few days (he is currently in Kuwait) to be the Deputy Advisor and I imagine that you two will be working together closely over the next several months. John is a Mesopotamian archaeologist who spent time in Iraq documenting the Nineveh reliefs in the late 1980's. He was part of the UNESCO mission that visited Baghdad in late May. He has been working for years on the problem of looting of sites in Iraq throughout the 1990's and I have been working with him (and others in the Archaeological Institute of America, including Mac Bell) since January trying to avert what ultimately came to pass.

I have been very involved, particularly with the US State Department as well as American archaeologists, with the legal issues that have arisen as a result of the problems in Iraq. I am particularly concerned with the looting which has been reported at numerous sites and I am working to pass legislation in the US Congress to prohibit the import of illegally removed Iraqi cultural materials and also to amend the U.S. legislation implementing the 1970 UNESCO Convention.

There are two matters of additional concern. One is that construction work may cause additional damage to archaeological sites. At one point we had drafted a provision for the construction contracts that the U.S. government is giving out, but that seems to have gotten bogged down somewhere in the U.S. government. The second concern is the development of the Iraqi Constitution and antiquities laws.

As you can see, I have followed the situation as closely as possible. I am more than happy to be of any possible assistance, whether in terms of legal advice or archaeological resources. Please do not hesitate to contact me if there is anything at all that I can do.

When you have the opportunity, please let me know when you will be going to Iraq and any other interesting developments.

CIMIC in Uruk

Next Tuesday, October 7th, the Crisis Management Center of the Netherlands Ministry of Defense will receive a set of reports and recommendations from a unique civilian-military program that forms part of the Dutch SFIR mission to the southern Iraqi province of al-Muthanna. The program goes under the name CIMIC, standing for Civil Military Cooperation. CIMIC is a relatively young NATO project, launched in 1997, which entails the "militarization" of civilian specialists by armed forces. Because most of Iraq is still a war zone to which civilians are not admitted, CIMIC officers are the only non-military professionals who can work on the ground in the country. To date, only the Netherlands has actually created a corps of militarized specialists under this program.

One of the five areas for which CIMIC is deployed, along with humanitarian aid, civil administration, civil infrastructure and economic and commercial activities, is cultural affairs. In any perspective that extends beyond the immediate concerns of the occupation, the section of the forthcoming report dealing with culture is bound to be a document of supreme importance.

As it happens, the territory for which the Netherlands took over military responsibility from America on 1 August includes the ruins of the ancient Sumerian city of Uruk. The significance of Uruk for the history of civilization can hardly be exaggerated. The site includes the earliest known monumental architectural complex, the earliest urban agglomeration, the seat of the earliest colonial power, the finding place of the earliest writing. The site was occupied continuously from the 5th millennium B.C. to the 3rd century A.D., with a highpoint in the fourth millennium B.C., a period known to students of the Ancient Near East as the Uruk period. Uruk is extraordinarily precious not only for its ziggurat and temples and clay tablets, but also as a touchstone for the study of early civilizations throughout the world.

It also provides a touchstone for judging our own civilization. In even a slightly more ideal world than ours, preserving Uruk would be a permanent top priority for all of mankind. As things stand today, the integrity of the site is guaranteed by nothing more than the good will of a Bedouin family and a paper-thin, non-committal, temporary line of outside support put in place by Dutch CIMIC officers on a brief assessment visit there four weeks ago.

Until the American military conquest of al-Muthanna last March, care for Uruk fell under the responsibility of the Iraq Department of Antiquities. This agency, founded in the 1920s, had an office in the provincial capital of as-Samawah, headed by an official named (b)(6). Although his staffing and budget declined drastically during the years of the UN embargo against his country (1991-2003), in early 2003 he still had a handful of guards in service. When America conquered the province, this structure disappeared from one day to the next. The 2,500 American troops in control of al-Muthanna from March until August had more important tasks than the preservation of Uruk. When they turned the province over to the Dutch, they left a long list of CIMIC tasks, which did not include safeguarding Uruk.

Nonetheless, the Dutch included two cultural specialists in the 8 man CIMIC team it sent to southern Iraq in the summer of 2003. CIMIC Cultural Affairs Network manager (b)(6) (b)(6) trained in art history and archaeology, and (b)(6), a specialist in Arabic, especially Bedouin dialects. They were flown into Basra on August 16th and after an insufficient two days to acclimatize to the brutal heat, they were flown in by Chinook Helicopter to as-Samawah. In the chaos and confusion, it took them a week to discover that (b)(6) had not abandoned his post, and was available to help with the safeguarding of archaeological sites. In the short time available to them, (b)(6) and (b)(6) were only able to make arrangements for Uruk, merely one, albeit the most important, of more than 100 valuable sites in the province.

The Bedouins they encountered there explained that Uruk (now called Warka) belonged to them, the at-Tobe clan, by virtue of an understanding with Bedouins of other tribes, who ruled over other parts of al-Muthanna. They wanted nothing more than to guard the site against plundering, but their power to do so was limited by lack of water and transport. The Dutch team, with its minimal means and narrow mandate, was only partly able to provide them with material support. Furthermore they called upon the newly re-installed local police force and Dutch MPs ((b)(6)) to keep an eye on Uruk.

The chairman of the CIMIC Network Team for Cultural Affairs, (b)(6) (b)(6) is at pains to insist that the function of his team not be confused with that of a cultural NGO or the Coalition Provisional Authority (CPA), which now exercises ultimate command over Iraq. Such bodies, if they could (as NGOs presently cannot) or desired (as the CPA does not)

would be able to create programs focussed on the protection of cultural heritage. The CIMIC mission is to execute quick-impact, high-visibility actions in the service of force protection.

If the CIMIC recommendations to the Dutch Minister of Defense include more extended measures for safeguarding Uruk, as they presumably will, they will have to be justified by military arguments. Irrespective of this, one hopes that they will be implemented quickly, and will stay in place until the Iraq Department of Antiquities once more takes proper charge of its tasks. In the meanwhile, one can only be thankful that two militarized Dutch cultural specialists, the only ones in all of Iraq, have been able to do as much as they did.

Tour of the MEF modifications at camp Babylon made 25th July 03 and added to on 29th July

The majority of the areas used by the Marine camp have utilized areas that had already been developed with buildings and roads etc. There are also some very flat areas that have been used for equipment, tents etc. In a few areas earth moving has taken place or heavy machinery and trucks have been driven across areas of the mound unprotected by paved roads nor part of existing tracks.

Trash dumps or birms

There are two of these. Trash dumps are rectangular areas with three bulldozed ridges. This shelters a central area in which rubbish is burnt. When the dump goes out of use the ridges are collapsed on top of the rubbish.

The southern one is south of the southern entry point to the west of the road and close to the east bank of the river and has been closed. It is likely that this dump being very close to the river that the upper few feet of soil are probably river silt and so it is unlikely that this dump will have affected any actual archaeological deposits.

The northern dump is still in use. The latter is out of the North ECP north of the Northern lake attached to the canal and to the east of the track running north along the river. It was in this area that on July 29th we discovered a 40ft x 10ft x 9-10 ft deep pit had been dug for the burning of rubbish (and this pit must have been dug after the 25th July when this area was first visited). The upper 5 ft of this pit had cut only river silt/agricultural soil but the lower 4 ft or so had cut archaeological deposits and much pottery was visible once the fire in the pit had abated. A visit was made to the camp commandant (b)(3):10 USC § on this matter. He had ordered the digging of this pit to try to keep children away from the burning rubbish as they had been scavenging through it.

(b)(6) was very disturbed by the digging of this pit which was reported to the Babylon museum by a local man who took some of the pieces of archaeological objects from the pit to the museum. (b)(6) feels that such digging will only encourage local people to dig holes as well. It seems rather disappointing after our efforts at co-ordination with the MEF with regard to minimizing the archaeological impact of activities at camp Babylon. Given that in this particular area archaeological deposits seem to be around 4 or 5 feet deep it seems likely that the bulldozed ridges of the birm will not have disturbed these to any great extent.

UAV runway

This is no longer in use but was situated on the west bank of the river opposite the Saddam Palace. To prepare the runway it was skimmed to remove topsoil and then compacted. Like other areas treated in this way it would then have been watered daily to keep down the dust. It seems possible that any archaeological deposits this close to the river probably lie under a few feet or more of river silt deposited by occasional flooding.

Tanker and truck parks, graveled tracks etc.

The riverside area north of the Saddam palace mound has been used as a truck and car park as well as the site of various portakabins. The areas here were very flat already so they were just graveled, they would not have needed skimming apparently. Further north

of this riverside area is the site of building debris that was presumably left over from the building of the Saddam Palace. The track at the base and to the west of the Saddam mound has been 'prepped' (ie. Skimmed, earth dumped, watered, compacted) and graveled. It is regularly watered to keep the dust down.

Gravel has been added to an area west of the tarmacked car park that is immediately west of the Greek amphitheatre. Presumably this area was prepped also. A couple of fuel tankers are parked on this area close to the fence with the car park. An extension of this graveled area was observed in progress on 17th July up to the fence of the Hammurabi museum and was sufficiently alarming with bulldozing, steam rolling to compact the earth etc. that (b)(6) and I intervened and asked the camp commandant ((b) (b)(3):10) to stop the work and not to use the area as a truck park as originally intended. An area north of this was starting to be used to store containers from trucks and these have now been moved to the paved car park at the east entrance to the site. In the area west of the amphitheatre where archaeological deposits are right at the surface the trucking of heavy machinery is likely to cause considerable damage. On the 25th July a 'ditch witch' was observed in use in this area, cutting into an area of mound to lay a cable. The driver was asked to desist and agreed, his work does not seem to have authorized by (b)(3):10 USC

To the north west of the amphitheatre are two fuel bladders surrounded by earth birms (ridges). It is not entirely clear where the earth for these came from, whether it was trucked in from outside the camp or the result of earth moving within the camp. Also in this area is a possible Iraqi army bunker position the construction of which is different to the Coalition bunkers.

Helicopter landing zones

It is in these areas that some of the most extensive surface bulldozing took place. The northern landing zone or LZ is NW of the amphitheatre, east of the processional way and west of one of the lakes. One part of this LZ is an already tarmacked area, this was then extended by bulldozing areas of the mounds flat and compacting them etc. One of these areas was described as clumpy or lumpy. I do not know if these were the remains of excavated mud brick walls that were eroding or the irregular surface of unexcavated mounds, either way the surface was bulldozed flat. It seems likely that this will have damaged archaeological deposits as they are generally close to the surface in this part of the site.

The southern landing zone near the southern ECP (entry check point) to the west of the road was apparently mostly gardens with ridges and ditches for irrigation like the remaining area immediately north of it. These ridges were bulldozed flat, red earth dumped and compacted and watered. It is then watered each day. A number of bunkers were dug into this area especially on its northern and western sides. The sections in all of these were scrutinized and none had any archaeological deposits in them. All seem to be agricultural soil/river silt. Some of the bunkers utilized the concrete bunker sections which reduce greatly the amount of digging that is done. In other areas of the site, concrete above ground bunkers are the norm.

The one area of the southern helicopter landing zone where archaeological damage may have been done is at its southeastern end close to the road where a mound was cut leaving a six foot section in some places. Outside the fence line the rest of this particular mound has a late Islamic ruin on top of it which is being used as an observation post. This landing zone is now going out of use and the helicopters are being replaced by tents for the Polish Coalition forces.

Other campsites include

1. SW of the Saddam palace mound and on the west bank of the river an existing group of buildings and car parks have been used as a camp, with tents in the car parks. This will have had no archaeological effect.

2. NE of the Saddam palace mound in groves of palm trees several tents were pitched with some graveling between the trees for vehicles etc. A bunker has been dug in the last week within the camp just west of the fencing that encloses the north palace mounds at this point. This structure is around 20 ft long, 12 ft wide and 3 ft deep. Inspection of the section inside did not reveal any archaeological material; it appears to be river silt. However it was dug at a time when there was supposed to be consultation re: any earth moving activities, it was not there on 21st July when fencing was measured in this area.

3. Immediately S of the reconstructed Southern palace of Nebuchadnezzar. This was already a flat area (possibly as a result of the reconstruction of the Southern Palace). Therefore it will not have required any bulldozing or flattening. The usual red earth was dumped, compacted and graveled and portakabins then placed on it, one area is used for large trucks.

In general terms the use of bulldozers, steam rollers and heavy vehicles on archaeological deposits is very bad news indeed, as it is likely to crush and destroy objects and features. Close to the river however, it seems likely that most areas have a few feet of river silt sealing any archaeological deposits and therefore activities at the surface will have less impact. Further away from the river, in the area of the amphitheatre and the northern helicopter landing zone archaeological deposits are not covered by several feet of river silt and therefore any bulldozing, compacting and use of heavy machinery will have a much more detrimental effect.

CPA**MINISTRY OF CULTURE - BAGHDAD****A sketch program of urgent restorations for important Iraqi Monuments**

In the very long lasting history of Iraq there are many important monuments which testify the imprint of this land on the civilization of mankind. Among them, of course, are the archaeological sites as Babylon, Ur, Assur, Niniveh, Nippur, and many others. A rough statistics lists about 10.000 archaeological sites in Iraq. The current efforts of the CPA and the Ministry of Culture are to establish an Archaeological Site Protection Corps, under the SBAH (State Board of Antiquities and Heritage) to control and protect the sites in strict coordination with local police stations. But beside this enormous amount of sites there are a few key monuments, part of the cultural and historic heritage of Iraq, which are in a serious peril of decay and that need a very urgent intervention to be saved. At the top of this list we can put at least four monuments/places which deserve our attention also because their loss could have a terrible psychological effect on the Iraqi people. They are namely the palace of Taq-I Kisra (Ctesiphon), the al-Hadba or Nour minaret in Mossul, the Jewish-Islamic complex of Kifel, and the ruined Castle of Kirkuk. A short description of each of these monuments will follow, together with an analysis of its present state, and, finally, some suggestions for a prompt "first aid" project.

Taq-i Kisra – Ctesiphon

The large palace of Ctesiphon was built during the Sasanian period by order of the king Khusraw II (591-628 A.D.), and is an outstanding masterpiece of world architecture. Its location is in the neighborhood of Baghdad, at south-east of the present town, near the Tigris river, and not very far from Seleucia, one of the most important Hellenistic towns of antiquity. Ctesiphon was the capital city of the Sasanian Empire, which lasted several centuries and was defeated by the Arabian tribes which were since few years converted to Islam. The fame of the palace was ubiquitous, and many literary sources magnify its role. There were paintings on the walls, mosaics, slabs of chosen marbles, and among the “furniture” one very famous carpet called “The spring of Khusraw”, embroidered with emeralds and other precious stones. Of course nothing of these materials remains in situ after the pillaging which occurred around the year 642, except part of its architecture which is by itself a wonderful achievement. What remains nowadays of the main palace is one very large *iwan* (an *iwan* is a barrel vaulted structure with three walls and the fourth open in front of a large court), which is large about 23 meters from side to side, some 30 meters high and about 50 long. The very characteristic shape of the arch – a sort of parabolic arch – has a very important and unique feature: it is a self-sustaining structure, that means it has been built without an extensive scaffolding sustain. So the Taq-i Kisra *iwan* is currently considered one of the most interesting and important architectures of the antiquity, due to the very original technical solutions given by anonymous but genial architects to an engineering challenge.

This monument has suffered of serious damage throughout the ages: in photographs taken in the late 19th century it is still possible to see that flanking the *iwan* there were two

remaining walls, but today only one, not in good condition, is still standing. Many restorations have already been done during the past decades, but the necessity of an urgent static analysis coordinated study of the surroundings of the monument together with consolidations, and, maybe, a well directed archaeological campaign should not be delayed further.

It is difficult to figure the cost of a radical, definitive setting up of Taq-i Kisra, until new surveys of the conditions after this war are done. The cost of the necessary studies, of clearing up the land around the site, scientific excavations to bring the monument to the original ground level of floor, can be estimated in about 1.8/2.0 millions US \$.

-Al Hadba an-Nuri of Mossul

The northern Iraqi town of Mossul has been a very important place in Islamic history. During the XIIth century, Zengi, a Turkish blood military chief, became the leader of the Anti-Crusade coalition, and tried to unify northern Syria (namely what is called the Jazira region) and the country of Mossul. The son of Zengi (from his name the Zengid dynasty), Nur ad-Din (the so called Norandin in the western literary sources) kept on with his father work. When he died (1171 AD) his own son was still a child of eleven years, and a Kurdish officer (named Salah ad-Din or Saladin) was appointed as his tutor and succeeded Nur ad-Din becoming Sultan of Egypt and Syria after the death of the last Fatimid caliph. Mossul itself became an important artistic centre and during the reign of Badr ad-Din Lu'lu (1222-1259), formerly a slave, maybe an Armenian or a Black), all kinds of arts, architecture, miniature painting, metalwork, developed to a very high standard of quality. Nur ad-Din was very fond of architecture and managed to patronize a lot of buildings (more than Saladin did) and in Mossul there were recorded seventeen *madrasa* (Koranic schools).

One of the most interesting buildings in Mossul was the mosque al-Nuriyya, with an old mihrab and carved columns which are signed by Mustafa al-Baghdadi and are dated 1148. Some precious decorations in stucco – a very widely used material in all Islamic periods – in the cupola and on the octagonal drum are dating from the reign of Badr ad-Din Lu'lu. The mosque has been transformed in the XVth century by works ordered by the Aq Qoyyunlu Uzun Hasan and later on by the Ottomans.

The minaret of the mosque is of a typical tall cylindrical shape, very popular in the Seljuk period. Now its appearance is rather strange as it leans down similarly to the famous Pisa Tower. Although it was restored at the end of the seventies, nowadays is going on a process of decay and there are cracks at the basement of the monument.

A quick intervention is strongly suggested, starting from a study of the surrounding area, up to a reinforcement of all the structures by the most advanced technical equipments.

The estimated cost is around 1.000.000 U.S. \$.

Dhu'l-Kifl Shrine

Dhu'l-Kifl is situated in a village known as al-Kifl, midway between Hilla (Babylon) and Najaf, about 130km south of Baghdad. The complex is composed of a mosque, a *turba* (shrine) with an external dome of conical shape with *muqarnas*, and a minaret. According to very old Jewish traditions the shrine contains the tomb of the prophet Ezekiel, also revered by the Muslims as one of the prophets mentioned in the holy Koran (21:85 and 38:48). It is not precisely known when this place became a religious centre, most probably since at least the VIth century B.C. The shrine has been for many centuries under Jewish control, until the Ilkhanid (Mongols) rulers of Iraq in 1316 decided after building a *turba* or shrine, the mosque and the minaret, to shift its custody to Muslim hands. The guardianship of the place remained to Muslims until the beginning of the twentieth century. A Jewish merchant, namely Minahaim Daniel, was able to persuade the Ottoman Sultan ruling Iraq to hand back the custody of the shrine to Jews. He also renovated the shrine and added to it many interesting Hebrew panels. A vaulted souk/bazaar was also built next to the mosque, and this structure still is known as Souk Daniel. The shrine is nowadays under the Awaqf authority and the State Board of Antiquities and Heritage is responsible for the security and maintenance.

In the last few months and particularly last April a looting of the shrine occurred and the buildings suffered a great damage and most of the Hebrew panels were stolen, as only one survived. However the State Board of Antiquities and Heritage has photographs of all the inscriptions which could be restored.

According to estimates done by the officers of the Iraqi State Board of antiquities the cost of repairs of the interior of the shrine is about 20.000 US \$, and for the prayer hall of the mosque 10.000 US \$. The cost of the repainting of the Hebrew panels could be around 15.000 US \$, and the restoration of the Souk Daniel – one of the few of this kind still surviving in Iraq – will be of 36.000 US\$, for a total cost of 91.000 US \$.

Dhu'l-Kifl is a very important place where the tradition of coexistence of different ethnic and religious communities, making a serious restoration particularly urgent on the basis of cultural and political reasons.

Kirkuk Castle

Kirkuk is an important town in the north east of Iraq. As many places around this country, Kirkuk has a very rich past, which roots are so deeply established that is impossible to trace them back to a fixed date. In medieval times Kirkuk was one of the main stop over centers in the main trade route from the Gulf up to Anatolia and Europe. It passed from hand to hand and to different Islamic dynasties during the centuries, always remaining a strategic town due to its geographical position. One of the most important ruling – dynasties was the Turkoman one during the XV-XVI centuries. Most of the important Islamic cities had a walled citadel where the local court took their seat.

The Castle of Kirkuk has been for centuries very well known for its interesting architectural features. The Kirkuk Castle was destroyed almost completely during the past few years, and its present state is today a rather poor one. Although its remains are very impressive, to start a proper program of restorations, scholarly done preliminary studies are needed. The State Board of Antiquities and Heritage should have old photographs of the Castle and, maybe, a relief of the site.

The most urgent problem is to control the present conditions of the Kirkuk Castle, and starting with a survey of the buildings and ruins to prepare a rehabilitation program. It is also necessary to underline the symbolic meaning for Kirkuk of this monument and the impact that such a restoration program could have on the Iraqi people.

For the preliminary studies and the documentation of the Castle of Kirkuk a sum of 10.000 to 20.000 US \$ is a fair rating figure.

dear all, (b)(6) I assume you are forwarding my emails to all interested members of the BSAI committee)

an update, we have given the mac gibson site list to both a marine called (b)(3):10 U and a (b)(3):10 U from US army, the latter sent by centcom who has said he will try to find out which sites are actually being patrolled. Yesterday while I was down in nasiriyeh (b)(3):10 U contacted (b)(6) about the list, apparently the grid coordinates are missing some figures making it imposs for the soldiers to tell where the sites are. (b)(6) spent the afternoon with a tourist map trying to show what general area thes sites were in which apparently was a help to (b)(3):10 U. We now have to get the same info to marine (b)(3):10 U, we have tried putting him and (b)(3):10 U in touch with each other to no discernable effect. The marines are esp relevant as I think it is them that do the patrolling.

I do not know if this

is a problem with the electronic file or just with our printout. We (ie (b)(6) and I) do not have access to the electronic file, (b)(3):10 USC has it somewhere on CD, so it could be that if the doc is in Excel or something and the columns on the tables are not set wide enough then the printout does not show all the figures of the grid coordinates. AAAHHHHHHHHH!!!! (b)(6) If you can help by sending the site list again to both me on this emial and to (b)(6) at the following (b)(6) (b)(6) it needs to go to both (b)(6) emials as the orha one is the only one to print out from but it is v difficult for (b)(6) to get more than about 10 mins per week on the one network computer whereas she can check hotmial at a trailer opp the rashid but cant printout there.

OK my trip to nasiriyeh with journalist (b)(6) (an ex student of (b)(6) (b)(6) trying to go on patrol with the marines. This did not happen for a variety of interesting and depressing reasons. (b)(6) had made contact with a (b)(3):10 USC§13 a marine reservist based at Sharra n of Nasiriryeh and he had been having his men do patrols and had been in touch with staff at the Nasiriyehnmuseum, wehn we arrived one of the staff was there to pick up a shulgi brick and wall cone from Lagash that one of the marine patrols had found in/near a looting pit, they had also been to Umma at whcih there was a looters village that they had tried to clear out (only way to tell if they succeeded is to go ther and see if it has been reoccupied. They claimed to have identified an antiquites market at Fajr but no action taken so far. HOWEVER (b)(3):10 US and his men are moving out soon and being replaced by Italians and the change over may be as little as 3 days, the sites are difficult for the soldiers to find without a local guide even if they have grid coordinates, and it was clear that (b) was winding down patrols as he was losing vehicles they were beign sent back or soemhting there was a military term which I forget soemthing like retrograded. So (b) said that the local police were doing the patrolling

now and said we could go with them to umma via Nasiriyeh to drop off the musuer chap and the stamped brick.

so off to Nasiriyeh, via a translater ans his shop, the Nasiriyeh museum, full of marines usign the glass cases as tables etc, argument over a requisitioned car, tea and a long dicussion with the pickup of local policemen who now said there was no way they could go to Umma as 1. their vehicle could not get there it could not do the tracks 2. they had to pick up a prisoner from the hospital so off they went we went to the CMOC headquarters in Nasiriyeh the Civil military I forget what the rest of it stand for and spoke to (b)(6), who talked the talk about protecting sites but it was unclear to me how much teh do from Nasiriyeh itself, certianly (b)(6) told me that they do not patrol Uruk from Nas as it is too far away for the patrols ! and CMOC nasiriayeh can not be ocnacted by the outside world they have no emial nor phones and lots of other things to do, there was a demonstration outside and a pol meeting inside and lots of NGOS in another meeting etc and people tugging (b)(6) sleeve every 2 seconds.

So (b)(6) next plan, go down to Ur and visit the airbase to find if anyone there knows of aerial reconisance being done of the sites. A dust storm blew up so v hot and desicating. I drank plenty of water (enough to pass it) but began to feel very sick and ill. We reached Ur could not see Ziggurat due to the dust in the air. Visited a tent to try to get to talk to someone, directed to a trailer, told that someone would come to speak to us, waited for around 3/4 of hour. The civil affairs people who came to speak to us know nothign about any aerial recon of sites, one of themn suggested that I should ask (b)(3):10 USC §130b !! I pointed out that she was not in the airforce and was unlikely to know about this, we left our emails with them and departed.

(b)(6) last idea, back to Shartra to toll (b)(3):10 US that the patrol of umma has not happened as the police vehicle could not do the road. I was feeling too ill to get out of the car so (b)(6) went to talk to them on his own. (b)(6) said there was no problem with the car and the road adn the pickup had doen that route before and he would sack the police. So that is the picture in an area that has a (b)(6) committed (b)(6) is genuinly intersted and doing his best, (b)(6) went down there because his attempts to join patrols in the Diwaniyeh area came to nought as NOTHING is happeing there tha he could find although they claimed to be doing random parols whatever that means. In D they have a (b)(6) who told (b)(6) that they have at no time been told that paroling arch sites is a priority and had lots of other things to do. I think I will be meeting (b)(6) soemtime as Qadasiyeh province is one of the ones covered by CPA heartland.

after Shartra we set off back to Baghdad stopped in Kut for dinner, (b)(6) was approached by someone offering antiquites for sale although the thing he showed us was just an odd geological stone formation and not a race object, he claimed to have other things, we said we would look at them if they brought them to us, the man said his house was too far away. It seemed interesting that the site of a foreigner could prompt them to try to sell you an antiquity.

I hope this gives you a general flavour of the situation here.

If I do manage to go on patrols I am a bit worried about surviving the heat, I did not even get into a humvee yesterday and was still ill.

John Russell has been in touch with (b)(6) about info so if someone could forward this to him or to anyone else in the profession who has a reason to want/need to know. I will rejoin the sassson list once down in Babylon which will be later today although I dotn know how soon I will be online down there.
